About Prabhat Education Foundation

Making learning a joyful experience for those who need an alternative

Prabhat Education Foundation serves children with special needs. Realizing the need for education and learning of this group and particularly of children Prabhat conceptualized an institutional facility to provide systematic learning and rehabilitation services. Prabhat's initiative reflects a journey that began in 2003 through the identification and nurturing of children with learning difficulties struggling in mainstream schools. By 2005 Prabhat had begun a small Centre to serve such children.

News of Prabhat spread, and children with a range of disabilities started arriving at its door, seeking assistance. Prabhat responded with a summer workshop in cooperation with the Ahmedabad Education Society. The workshop provided an opportunity for all concerned to exchange experiences and ideas. It also helped to reveal the extent and range of the special needs required within the city of Ahmedabad. What started as a modest beginning, with one child in the year 2007, today Prabhat caters to a number of children with special needs.

Outreach and advocacy efforts of the Centres continued to provide support to other children, homes and communities. Advocacy efforts to establish partnerships with the municipal and other schools helped to evince their support to the national effort to recognize the rights of children with special needs, and offer services to them within the mainstream schemes and Programs.

Today, Prabhat's programmatic activities and services are carried out under 3 major areas:

Prabhat Centres: The Centres constitute the core Prabhat's Programmes – creating an environment in which the needs, abilities and challenges of children with special needs are respected and opportunities created for them to learn and to grow as citizens. Centres are designed as 'welcoming and cheerful' spaces for therapy, play and learning by doing.

Community-Based Rehabilitation Program (CBR): The goal of Prabhat's CBR is to create enabling environments and capacities within the communities and homes to support and encourage those children with special needs and their families who cannot access Prabhat Centres due to barriers of mobility, distance or awareness. CBR is directed toward generating awareness, knowledge and capacity within homes and neighbourhoods that can mobilise them to support and nurture children with special needs.

Advocacy through networking: Advocacy strengthens each of these services and creates a more enabling environment for children with special needs in the society. One of the main aims of Prabhat's advocacy is removal of stigma and fear attached with disability, so that children with special needs are included as equals within the Indian society.

Executive summary

Prabhat is overwhelmed with all the support and warmth it has been receiving from supporters, friends and well-wishers. We are also happy to inform that the organization has made some strategic partnerships during this time with Wipro Foundation (<https://wiprofoundation.org/>), Dasra (<https://www.dasra.org/>) and Social Venture Partners (<https://www.socialventurepartners.org/>). These partnerships will help Prabhat formalize a lot of processes like the transition of a child with disability from the local anganwadi to a regular school and further the assimilation of young adults with intellectual disability into the regular work force. Processes which were existent but will now be strengthened through these partnerships and support. The support Prabhat gets from Timberline Foundation and Dasra are very strategic for overall organizational growth and stability, which has been a pressing need especially during the re-building process post the lockdown.

Prabhat is also happy to inform with the increasing volunteer support that it has been receiving since the lockdown. Young students with varied experiences are bringing a fresh, happy and an overall knowledge sharing atmosphere to all Prabhat spaces. Currently Prabhat has over 60 volunteers bringing joy to the students of Prabhat. Working with these volunteers is also building the capacities of the team, who are learning new skills.

Decentralization has been key to keeping Prabhat's activities afloat and reaching to a larger population. Prabhat is now operating from two main Centres and 3 dehlus (informal small set-ups) and a few early intervention cells. The organization is serving close to 200 children through these set-ups on a regular basis, apart from this through CBR programme over 500 PwDs including children are being served by way of assessments, aids and appliance distribution, medical camps, assistive services (accessing social entitlement schemes), ration distribution, etc.



Programme update

Prabhat Centres

There were several lessons learnt during the pandemic and thereafter, especially the need for increasing parent trainings. That has been the focus area this year.

In the early part of 2021, Prabhat Centres worked as a resource space for parents and other community members for material and service distribution, like:

- Monthly ration (food grains),
- Clothes,
- Aids and appliances
- Study materials etc.
- Counselling and guidance
- Remedial classes
- Distribution of trolley cart for self-employment for PwDs.

Gatherings were prohibited for a large part of early 2021. Soon after, assessment for children began which included a 360 degree check-up for almost 300+ children associated with Prabhat. Assessments included physical, mental and emotional assessments. There were notable regressions in some of the children which was concerning and required immediate attention, for which Prabhat raised funds and gathered resources to purchase hi-end equipment to provide the child with the focused therapy assistance.

Prabhat continued with relief services (providing ration, clothes, etc.) even after situations returned to normal, as employment was still a big challenge for several families in the community.

Services at the Prabhat Centre through the reporting period included:

- **Ration distribution:** with the support from well-wishers and donors Prabhat is happy to share that it reached more than 1000 families (under one year) through ration and food distribution and still continues the process for some very needy families.



- **Increasing parent counselling and guidance:** The need for parental counselling and guidance increased during the lockdown. At the time the team provided services over the phone or via video calling. Once the Centres started operating a huge inflow of parents was seen coming in for counselling on a daily basis, thus the frequency of the counselling had to be increased. During the pandemic small parent support groups were formed which proved to be a big help in the community. The support groups, have experienced parents along with a Prabhat team member to provide guidance quickly in case of any emergency. Parents have always been a pillar of support for Prabhat, even during the pandemic and subsequent lockdown parents whole heartedly supported Prabhat in its endeavor to reach the child and provide the needed support. The lockdown phase also brought to light the benefits of the parent trainings and the persistence of having parents sit through during the physiotherapy sessions way before the pandemic. It also reiterated the need to provide guidance and counselling on how to actively engage the child in the absence of a physical Prabhat Centre.



- **Academic learning:** Regular academic sessions at the Prabhat Centres began after September 2021, until then online and hybrid models were used to conduct sessions. The hybrid model which meant a child would come to the Centre twice a week, was a successful process to re-introduce the child back to the Centre routine and schedules. Each child was welcomed with open arms, everyone from the team was overjoyed, as it was a feeling long awaited! During the lockdown and the restrictions which followed for well over a year, all Prabhat's students were provided with regular online learning material, with scheduled one-on-one video lessons with the teachers. Despite these systems which were put in place several learning gaps were identified. Each child's individual plan had to be re-evaluated and redesigned based on the levels post the lockdown. With



several interactive Teaching and Learning materials (TLMs) made in-house by the Prabhat team during the lockdown along with a repository of online videos for the children made by volunteers from various schools and colleges, bridging the learning gap was a little easier. The initial few weeks just involved re-acclimatizing the children back to the Centre. Some of them just could not contain the joy! Parents were equally happy, especially mothers. During the time the Prabhat Centres reopened, several mainstream schools in the vicinity were still not functioning, so, Prabhat took this opportunity and invited siblings to come along and learn at the Centre.

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- **Remedial classes:** The remedial classes are a part of the mainstreaming process at Prabhat. This involves preparing a child with mild and moderate level disabilities to join a regular/mainstream school. It includes bringing the child up to speed with the grade-based academic curriculum, acclimatizing the child to the school environment as well as acclimatizing the school to the child, which includes sensitization training for the school authorities and awareness/advocacy with the other students and their parents. The school program team worked hard continuously to keep the children abreast even during the lock down. These children now come to the Centre for classes, their school admission process is underway. There are currently 70 children being prepared in the remedial classes, they are of different age groups and varied disabilities.



- **Towards building smooth processes in education for children with disability:** To strengthen the existing process of mainstreaming and regularise the transition of a child with disability from a preschool (Anganwadi) to a regular school, Prabhat has collaborated with Wipro Foundation from the past few months. Towards this Prabhat is striving towards strengthening Anganwadis and schools, especially municipal schools through regular sensitization trainings. Along with this preparatory classes at Prabhat's Centre for the identified children have begun. The partnership of Prabhat with Wipro Foundation is also strengthening the capacities of the core team at Prabhat. Prabhat and Wipro Foundation aim to setup a model/example on inclusive education which can travel and be replicated in other areas as well.
- **Buddy Interaction:** Buddy Interaction has been an integral process of opening up the world to Prabhat's children. This interaction is a mutually benefitting process, both for the Prabhat child as well as for the student from a mainstream school. This year along with Riverside School, other schools in the city which joined hands in the buddy interaction initiative include Red Bricks School and Rachna School. The students from the Red Bricks School developed a succinct booklet for the students of Prabhat, explaining in a very simple way the schedule to follow through the day. They dedicated months to develop this book (which is being used at the Centres), researching on how it should be accessible for children with varied disabilities like colorblindness, progressive blindness, etc. The Riverside students prepared several audio video learning material for the children. Students had interactions over video calls.



- **Assessment camps:** Having identified the developmental gaps arisen among the children, a detailed assessment was a priority. Children came on a rotational basis to avoid overcrowding. All the assessments were conducted by experts, some in-house and few external. As advised by them Prabhat will have to keep a close check on the development of the children, which will involve frequent assessments to avoid any further derailment of the rehabilitation process affecting the growth of a child along with use of specified equipment to provide relief and stabilize any regression. Prabhat worked towards raising fund to procure new equipment and finally with the support from Wipro Foundation, was able to bring in high-end physiotherapy equipment. During the reporting period, assessments for over 250 children have been conducted. Each child's developmental charts prepared and also shared with the parents.



- **Outdoor exposure visits:** Being used to regular outdoor exposure visits, Prabhat's children missed this activity the most during the lockdown and during the subsequent restrictions. As soon as the situation got better, Prabhat's students were invited to The Riverside School for a day out. Prabhat's children love being there. The comfort, the warmth they receive from the entire family of the Riverside school (teachers, students, and support staff) is beyond words. Children played, enjoyed music and wonderful snacks. The much awaited visit finally took place. Prabhat's children also participated in the 'Happy Street'/Street Smart an event organized by aProCH an NGO working towards building a 'child-friendly city'. The 'Happy Street' event is organized at one of the busiest streets of



Ahmedabad once in a couple of months and for that day, the street is converted into a children's playground. It is a sight to be seen. Prabhat's children enjoyed thoroughly and soaked up every bit of the fun. Prabhat's children were invited for a fun day out with a 'man's best friend', organized by Qi to Happiness (an organization providing animal assisted therapy). They engaged in different games with their therapy dogs and enjoyed a scrumptious buffet. Outdoor visits provide children opportunity of learning from external factors, they learn social interaction, become more aware of their surroundings. This eventually boosts their confidence which helps in their overall growth and development.

- **Physiotherapy:** One of the core focus areas post the lockdown has been physiotherapy. Thorough assessments conducted by experts have highlighted the physical developmental gap and regression among the children, which would eventually affect their overall development. Prabhat focused on strengthening the therapy service with improved equipment and increasing the therapy frequency for the children. Children under home-based rehabilitation were also encouraged to come to avail this facility at the Centre. Prabhat was able to procure advanced and hi-end therapy equipment with the support of Wipro Foundation and provide the children the much needed care and support.
- **Khel Maha Kumbh:** After a two years gap the much awaited national sports event Khel Maha Kumbh was back. This is an event that Prabhat's children practice all year round and wait to participate in with bated breath. A total of 150 children with varied disabilities from

Prabhat participated in the event. Out of these 10 received prizes in different categories. Participation in these public events boosts the confidence of the children and also their parents, who now encourage their ward to participate. About 8-9 years back the situation was completely different, Prabhat teachers had to plead and convince parents to allow their child to participate! Jagrutiben a special educator at Prabhat, reminisces the time when they had to travel from Ahmedabad to Surat for the next round of the competition and parents of few key players refused to send them. Jagrutiben kept trying to reach them (a time when mobile phones were not so common), after waiting for about 2 hours at the bus stand, she finally decided to go to their homes. After three long hours of going door to door convincing the parents, they halfheartedly agreed to let their wards go with her. All the 5 children she took with her came back winning prizes. A couple of them won over 5000 rupees (a fairly good amount, almost as much as a month's salary for majority of the parents). That is when a huge shift and behavioural change was noticed among the parents, who truly started realizing the ability of their children.

Festivals at Prabhat are all about the coming together as a large community. This year Prabhat shared the excitement and joy of the celebrations with various local schools, neighbourhoods and off course Prabhat's family.

Community based rehabilitation

- **Aids and appliance distribution:** The aids and appliance distribution has been one of the most integral parts of Prabhat's working. To provide aids and appliances to those with special needs means giving them mobility and helping them lead a more independent life. The distribution of aids and appliances done by Prabhat is not limited to only children but extends to adults with disabilities as well. During the year total number of aids and appliance distributed were over 350. Types of aids include – wheel chairs, crutches, calipers, splints, motorized wheel chairs, walker, colour coded canes.

- **Assistive services:** Assistive services at Prabhat include access to government entitlements for those with disabilities. The access and securing of these entitlements help a person with disability to avail several benefits, especially for those from the financially marginalized section of the society. The assistive services include access to state transport bus passes, railway pass, Aadhar card (a unique identification id), ration card (which helps them secure basic staples, like rice, wheat, pulses, etc. at subsidized rates from the Public Distribution Systems), pension schemes, etc. Apart from this, Prabhat's team also helps to access important basic documents required to avail the entitlements, like a medical certificate and sometimes birth certificates as well.



- **Community level assessment camps:** Assessments camps began in the middle of 2021 and went on regularly on a rotational basis as each child had to go through multiple rounds of assessment post the lockdown. All round - physical, mental and emotional assessments were conducted for the children over a span of 5-6 months to get the complete status of each child. Based on the reports of the assessments, per child goal charts were prepared in accordance with experts. Most of the goal charts this year have been focusing on addressing regressions and stagnation of growth and development among the children. This has been challenging but with the help of specialised equipment now at Prabhat, the team is able to handle and provide every child the needed care and support. Prabhat is extremely grateful to all the experts extending their support to provide the children the focused and specialised check-ups during these vulnerable times.
- **Home-Based Rehabilitation:** The HBR initiative has been one of the pioneering initiatives at Prabhat, catering to those who cannot reach any institutional facility for rehabilitation due to issues of mobility. Currently Prabhat serves 50 children with severe and multiple disability under this initiative. Once the therapy services were restored at the Prabhat Centres early in the year, several parents started bringing their child to the facility to avail specialised therapy services, which otherwise is not possible at home. This has proven to be very beneficial for the child as they also get to interact with other children at the Centre.

- **Survey:** Post the lockdown it was essential to conduct surveys as there was a lot of migration reported. The survey helps to identify any new children/adults with disability in the geographical areas Prabhat works in. This year Prabhat conducted surveys in three areas Shah-wadi, Danilimda and Behrampura. Although Shah-wadi is an area Prabhat has served in the past but being predominantly a migrant community there are new residents very often. Thus Prabhat engages in short door to door surveys to identify new children with special needs every now and then, more so post the lockdown. The survey also gives an insight into the lives of the population – language, culture, etc. which later help in designing community engagement activities. Over 55 children have been identified with varied disabilities through these surveys. Counselling and guidance sessions for parents have been conducted and some children are already at the Prabhat dehlus and some have joined the Centre. Individual Education Plan (IEP) have also been prepared, based on the needs and abilities of each child. Prabhat takes the support and help of volunteers to conduct these surveys.



- **Anganwadi and school trainings:** A total of 22 new anganwadi (government run pre-schools) have been identified and networks built for the purpose of preparing the angwadi to admit children with disabilities from the nearby areas. Most of the time due to lack of awareness, children with disabilities are not admitted into these establishments, thus Prabhat has been closely working with them for years to build a system where there is smooth assimilation of a child with disability from home- to anganwadi-to school and further on. This year Prabhat has started working closely with 4 private schools and aims to reach out 3 government schools with the same aim as that for an anganwadi. First phase of orientation and training has taken place with the teachers and staff of



these schools. This involves building an understanding of disability, Prabhat's work and the importance of providing equal opportunities for all children.

- **Building towards improved health:** In December-January 2020, Prabhat conducted a series of awareness workshops in partnership with Oowomaniya on menstruation and menstrual hygiene. These series received encouraging response which pushed the team to continue the sessions online into early June 2021. These sessions were designed to address the concerns, educate and empower the women and especially young girls. Some pertinent issues/focal points of the workshop included process for personal hygiene and specific health issues related to menstruation, care to be taken during the time, and breaking the myths and taboo attached with it. Prabhat with the technical support provided by Oowomaniya, continues to now spread health awareness, focusing on menstrual hygiene in schools. Through the year several workshops were conducted in schools at the community level, for grades 6 through 12. All the schools have been very accommodating to provide space and logistics to conduct these workshops. The sessions are kept interactive, with lot of questions coming from the young students. Students were also provided with biodegradable sanitary pads. These workshops are also facilitating partnership between Prabhat and the school, which will help pave a way for the admission of children with special needs.

- **Reigniting old methods:** With the onset of the pandemic and its after effects, Prabhat realized the need to revisit and strengthen some earlier processes of decentralization, like the *dehlu*, to reach out to more children in smaller spaces scattered across Prabhat's geographical locations. Thus, this year Prabhat set-

up 3 more *dehlus* and 2 Early Intervention cells, which have enabled more children to join in, including those from under the home-based rehabilitation. The *dehlus* provide academic learning through play, pre-vocational training and therapy, focusing on physiotherapy, although these services are at a much smaller scale than the what is provided at the Prabhat Centre however this opportunity then ensures them reaching the Prabhat Centres eventually for better treatment and rehabilitation.

- **Parent participation:** Prabhat has always adopted and believed in participatory processes because of which majority of the activities at Prabhat are sustainable and replicable. From the past few months' parents and siblings have been encouraged to spend time at the *dehlus*/Centres with the child, and also share and learn from other parents. These engagements help form support groups and also better prepare parents for unforeseen events. With the situation the world faced with the lockdown the need for formation and sustenance of informal support groups was reiterated. These groups were responsible for sustaining mental health in several communities that Prabhat serves, especially for mothers. By increased participation of family members in the activities, the child feels loved and appreciated. Parents have also been instrumental in introducing various new activities, like yoga, dance sessions, etc. at the *dehlus*.



- **Vocational opportunities for those with intellectual disabilities:** Studies showed that there are 31 million individuals with intellectual disability in India. Only 1% of children with disabilities have access to schools in India and majority of them are debarred from full participation in their families, communities, and societies due to their disabilities. The lack of physical access to facilities, transportation, and information circumscribes them from enjoying equal opportunities in housing, employment, and health care. Prabhat has a total of 524 young adults who fall in this category and realising the need to provide them with vocational opportunities, Prabhat has been working towards building collaborations and partnerships to develop a model where the youngsters can have a safe and productive work environment.
- **Building a self-reliant generation:** Prabhat has been providing rehabilitation for children with varied disabilities for over 15 years. Majority of the children at Prabhat are now at an employable age. Realizing the reality of people with disabilities in the job market in India especially is very bleak and more so for those with intellectual disabilities. Prabhat for the past one year has been devising a model for employment, for youth with intellectual disability (ID). This involves setting up a training unit with focus on 4-5 trades to prepare youth with ID for employment and also network with factories in and around to encourage them to hire the youth. Prabhat inaugurated its first vocational unit in June 2021, skills and trade as per the interest, ability and market. This includes: tailoring, electrical work, making paper bags, baking, data entry and making clay products. Prabhat is overwhelmed with the support it has received for this venture. A majority of the children Prabhat works with have multiple disabilities which make it difficult for a lot of them to reach any institutional facility, so for those young adults Prabhat will strive to find work that can be done at home with support from others in the house. Prabhat wants to set-up a model which can be replicated by other organizations to reach many more youth with ID, providing them equal opportunity for growth and development. An important part of this initiative is also training and sensitizing industries and establishments to hire people with intellectual disabilities.

- **In search of appropriate employment spaces:** While it is important to prepare the young adult with ID for employment, it is equally important to find appropriate work spaces for them, where the team is ready to be sensitized and willing to welcome a person with ID in its work force. Towards this the Prabhat team visited Norquest Brands a leading global supplier of bespoke, eco-friendly bags in India. The brand has been a strong supporter for creating equal work spaces. Norquest Brands has already hired 5 young adults with ID from Prabhat in his factory. Prabhat looks forward to having many more such champions in its quest to seek employment for people with ID.

Advocacy through networking

- **Institutional collaborations:** Prabhat is gradually being recognized as a training hub for institutes and a reliable space for students to gain volunteering experience. The association with Ahmedabad University continues. Over the course of one year, Prabhat has had over 400 student volunteers from Ahmedabad University alone. This is providing Prabhat opportunities for large scale awareness building and also lends hand to get fresh perspective from young minds for qualitative enhancement of interventions. The assistance provided to Prabhat include – developing teaching and learning material, developing training material, conducting fun sessions with the children, helping with data organization and representation. Other educational institutions that Prabhat is working with include – NID, Gujarat Vidyapeeth, L. J. Law College, Sharda College of physiotherapy, Composite Regional College (CRC), Narsee Monji Institute of Management Studies (NMIS), Pandit Deendayal Energy University. Prabhat has been fortunate to get student volunteers from across the country, especially during Covid and after that.



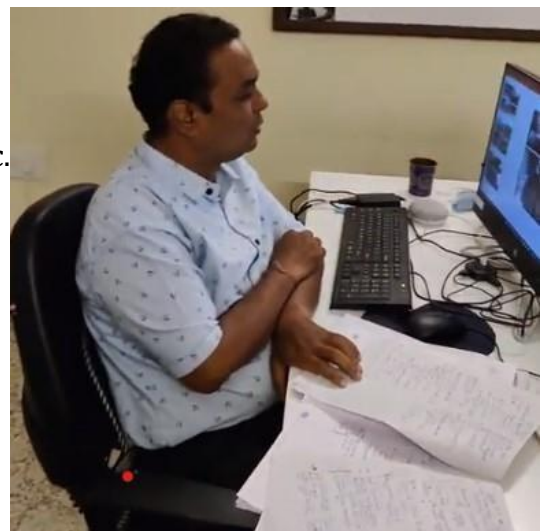
- **Capacity building:** Prabhat as an organization strongly believes in supporting and cherishing the aspirations of its team members and towards this, the team is regularly given opportunities for capacity building. During the reporting period, the team attended a series of workshops on – financial resilience, building back communities after the pandemic and improved knowledge sharing between development organizations. We thank Dasra for organizing these remarkable sessions through the month. With the access to trainings across the globe, the team has had very interesting opportunities for learning and enhancing their skills. Some key capacity building workshops include that with Ms. Deepa Sonpal, a disability rights activist and Prita Jha, a legal activist and researcher who provided in-depth information and understanding on

the POSCO act, which is essential as Prabhat serves a lot of minor children. Another interesting and engaging experience for the team was a theatre and puppet workshop organized for an in-person experience, a much needed stress buster post the lockdown. The team on the occasion for Helen Keller's birthday attended a national level webinar organized by Sense International. These platforms give Prabhat's team an opportunity to understand a national level perspective of disability and an in-depth understanding of the work other organizations across the country are doing. Prabhat conducts community level surveys frequently, to make this process smooth and more effective, the team learnt the use of a new mapping software for easier data collation and management.

Prabhat over the years has been able to establish a replicable model of its CBR intervention, which is being recognized by the local government and other organizations as a sustainable process with community ownership. Prabhat's association with NR Institute of



Physiotherapy dates back to almost 3 years. It was through a field visit of the faculty of the Institute that the realization of the range of disabilities that Prabhat works with, and the value addition that it can bring for their students if they spend time observing the working of the organization over a substantial period of time, was understood to be very beneficial. Since then Prabhat regularly has been training almost 20-25 students from NRIP every six months. Prabhat's teachers have also been called in to take lectures for the students at the college. These associations are mutually beneficial as the organization also gains a lot from these young minds who come to learn.



- **Teacher training and anganwadi workers workshops:** Prabhat in partnership with Wipro Foundation is striving towards building smooth processes in education for children with disability. To strengthen the existing process of mainstreaming and regularise the transition of a child with disability from a preschool (anganwadi) to a regular school, regular teacher training workshops began, soon after the restrictions were lifted. Over 60 teachers from various schools have been trained, along with 40 anganwadi workers from 20 anganwadi in the wards Prabhat works in. The training begins with an orientation to disability and Prabhat's work and then delves into how some disabilities can be identified and what is the kind of support the school, specifically the teacher can provide for the child to thrive in and changes that can be brought, in the pedagogy to make learning fun for all. Preparatory/remedial classes have also begun for the children at Prabhat's Centre. Prabhat with the support from Wipro Foundation, aim to setup a model



on inclusive education which can travel and be replicated in other institutions as well.

- **Parent training:** Is an integral process of Prabhat's working, the effectiveness and importance of it came to fore during the lockdown, where parents were not left without knowing how to handle and engage their child. Prabhat increased the frequency of the parent trainings post covid. In this new normal the focus of these trainings have been building a deeper understanding of the child's disability, and abilities, of the child, how can the child be engaged productively at home combined with her learning. Also in focus was healthy diet and hygiene issues.

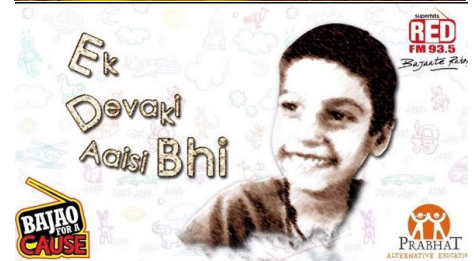
Prabhat regrets to mention about the sad demise of Devaki, Prabhat will miss her dearly and conveys deepest condolence to the bereaved families.

Devaki

“Ek Devaki aisi bhi!” a campaign for Prabhat by Red FM in 2017, where Prabhat’s little Devaki alias Devika was the star. She was the one through whom Ahmedabad was buzzing with awareness about special needs. Devika was born in Rajasthan with a bright look in her eyes and a smile on her face. Devika lost her father very early in childhood and her mother moved to Ahmedabad with her two daughters. Her mother made a living by doing some work, which was sourced with the help of her aunt and grandmother. In 2015, during Prabhat’s door to door campaign and survey, it was found out that 7-year-old Devika was a victim of Cerebral Palsy. Since then, she had been associated with Prabhat family. Since Devika had severe mobility problems, she was enrolled in the institute's homebase program. Which meant that a special educator would visit her at her residence for her sessions and a physiotherapist would visit her once a week for her therapy. As soon as the sessions started, a ray of hope was ignited for the family members anticipating that Devika would now be able to learn and be an active part of the society. The sessions as well as the therapy started showing results, wherein Devika who used to be unable to use her arms and legs at all, now started holding things, eat by herself, wear a T shirt on her own and could stand with the help of a walker. In spite of having severe stiffness in her arms and legs, she moved in the house and backyard, where she loved playing with mud and water. The interns from NID were thrilled to meet an enthusiastic Devika and therefore took up the task of designing a trolley for Devika so that she could move independently. Devika loved the trolley as it gave her much needed mobility as well as used it to sit and do various fine motor, sensory and academic activities. Devika became very popular in her area as she helped organized summer camps, drawing competitions, Garba and other activities in her locality. Devaki became the main protagonist when Prabhat joined hands with Radio Mirchi and came up with a campaign “Ek Devaki aisi bhi” with RJ Devaki. It was during this campaign that Ahmedabad Mayor Shri Gautambhai Patel visited Devika’s house along with RJ Devaki. Devika/Devaki became a face to the Awareness Campaign for Special Needs and reached out to the huge population of Ahmedabad through radio.

Recently, Devika started keeping unwell with fever, cold and cough. This made her weak as she started having difficulty even in eating food. In spite of her deteriorating health, she participated in the lunch program organized by Prabhat. Destiny made this visit her last visit as she left for heavenly abode a week later on 19th May 2022. Though Devika lived a short life, she lived an exemplary life teaching all of us how to live our lives happily and enthusiastically and not get bogged down by any limitations in life.
