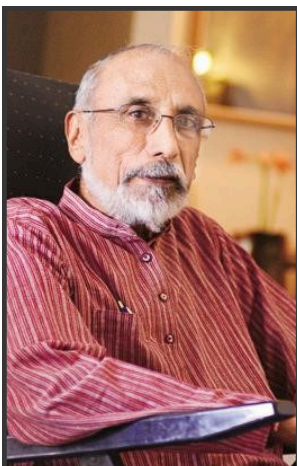

As we reflect on Prabhat's path over the past year, we see that each small step taken by our children, families, community leaders, volunteers, and team has been part of something far greater than its immediate result. It has been a journey toward belonging: not simply of places or programmes, but of hearts and minds.

Inclusion, to us, is not a project. It is a promise that every child, regardless of ability, will be seen, heard, and supported with dignity. This year has tested that promise many times. We saw children who waited too long for diagnosis finally begin therapy; families who carried the burden of stigma slowly find community, voice, and strength. From Anganwadi centres to resource rooms, from health camps to hoardings that shine across the city, our shared belief that difference is not deficit has taken shape in real moments.

Yet, we also confronted old struggles in new places: delayed awareness, limited access, the stubborn weight of believing that inclusion is optional. We don't yet have all the answers, but this year has made something clear. Early diagnosis, caregiver participation, and community awareness are no longer optional.

As we move forward, Prabhat will deepen its engagement with those who first see the child: parents, families, Anganwadi workers. We will stand with communities that lack access, reaching them with home-based support, with opportunity, with belief. We will seek partnerships, research, and innovations that do not merely assist but transform. Because a child's right to belong must never depend on geography or background.

To all who walk this path with us — the children, their families, our staff, partners, donors, well-wishers: we thank you. This is your journey too. In the year ahead, may we continue to take brave steps: because every child deserves not just a place, but a voice, not just care, but hope.

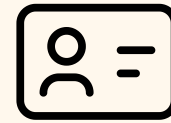

Prabhat Centres

Prabhat's Centres remain the heart of its work. It is a space where children with disabilities (CwDs) and their families find not just therapy and education, but also community, dignity, and hope. Over the years, these Centres have grown into vibrant hubs of inclusion, drawing children from diverse socio-economic backgrounds, many from marginalized and underserved communities. Each day at Prabhat Centres is a woven balance of therapies, structured activities, play, and learning opportunities. At its core lies the belief that every child can grow and thrive when given a nurturing environment, appropriate interventions, and exposure to the world beyond.

This year, the Centres continued to expand their reach, welcoming new children while deepening interventions for those already in the program. The strength of the Centres lies in their ability to evolve — adapting to each child's needs, engaging parents as partners, and building bridges with mainstream institutions. The following recurring activities reflect how Prabhat ensures consistency of care, while still tailoring interventions uniquely for every child.



Assessments

“An assessment is not about pointing out what a child cannot do, but about mapping the possibilities. It helps us plan interventions that are realistic, measurable, and filled with hope.”

Every journey at Prabhat begins with an assessment. It is a careful process of understanding the child’s abilities, needs, and potential. Parents often arrive with high hopes, believing that their child will “overcome” a disability and return to what they see as normal. While these expectations are deeply human, they are also difficult to navigate. Assessments thus become more than clinical exercises; they are also moments of counselling, where families gently begin to understand that progress looks different for every child.

This is an emotionally demanding process for both parents and professionals. It requires patience, compassion, and clarity to help families reframe their expectations while still holding on to hope. Each assessment lays the foundation for an individualized plan, ensuring that interventions are meaningful and realistic.

Exposure Visits

Exposure visits remained a vibrant part of centre life, taking children beyond familiar walls and into spaces of learning, joy, and discovery. Whether at a park, a museum, market or a local event, these outings are opportunities for children with disabilities to interact with the wider community and experience the world around them.

Such visits build confidence, nurture social skills, and normalize inclusion by allowing children to learn and play alongside their peers. For families, these moments are deeply affirming as they witness their children thriving in public spaces, a reminder of the importance of accessibility and acceptance.



Mainstreaming

Prabhat's commitment to inclusion was reflected in continued efforts toward mainstreaming children into regular schools. This process is never linear, and each child's readiness depends on a mix of academic progress, social adaptability, and family support. For parents, mainstreaming represents a chance to see their child share classrooms, friendships, and opportunities with others. This year, 7 children were successfully admitted into Anganwadis and schools after careful preparation and collaboration with families and teachers.

New Centre in Bhaipura

This year also marked an important expansion of Prabhat's reach with the opening of a new centre in another urban slum area, Bhaipura. The decision grew out of listening closely to community needs and recognizing the lack of support services in underserved localities. The new centre has already begun to provide assessments, therapy, and counselling, offering families a much-needed resource within their neighbourhood.

For Prabhat, this expansion is not simply about numbers but about deepening its roots within communities where the need is greatest. It reflects an ongoing belief that inclusion must not remain confined to privileged spaces, but extend to children and families everywhere.





Fenil's First Steps: A Story of Collective Care

Born with a genetic disorder affecting his mobility, speech, and vision, Fenil faced steep developmental challenges even after early medical interventions. His family found hope at Prabhat's Bhaipura Centre, where a personalized therapy plan was created under the guidance of Dr. Kavitha, our physiotherapist.

With daily support from his mother, Nikhilaben, Fenil practiced weight-bearing, functional tasks, and speech therapy—both at the centre and at home. Today, he walks independently, a milestone that once felt out of reach.

Fenil's journey reflects the power of collaborative care and the transformative role Prabhat Centres play in empowering families and enabling children with disabilities to thrive.



Anganwadis & Inclusive Practices

Prabhat's engagement with Anganwadis this year deepened its commitment to building inclusive ecosystems where the child remains at the center. With Wipro's support, our team worked closely with Anganwadi workers across Vatva, Bhaipura, and Berral Market, demonstrating inclusive methods, introducing child-friendly teaching materials, and creating dialogue around early education for every child. This also marked the start of Phase II of the project, where the focus shifts from outreach to transformation—preparing Anganwadis to emerge as inclusive centers over the next three years.

To strengthen this effort, we welcomed the guidance of Pragat Shikshan Sansthan (PSS), pioneers in Early Childhood Education. They will continue to mentor our team and Anganwadi workers in child-centric teaching, small-group learning, and sustainable classroom practices. Early feedback from the ground of this implementation has been encouraging so far.



Sports & Inclusion

Sports provide a powerful platform for inclusion, dignity, and confidence, a vision echoed by the government through initiatives like the Khelo India. Prabhat mirrors this vision at the community level by engaging children with special needs in Khel Mahakumbh, Gujarat's state-level sports event, nurturing their skills, courage, and sense of belonging.

In 2023, Sofiya had won second place in basketball. While this year, five other children earned medals in walking races and Bocce. Parents celebrated their children's achievements with pride. Fuzail's mother shared, "We are very happy, and even our relatives and neighbors celebrated his win." Beyond medals, these experiences inspire children to dream, reinforcing Prabhat's commitment to holistic development and building a truly inclusive society.

Buddy Interaction

Prabhat's Buddy Interaction initiative creates opportunities for children to connect as equals, beyond labels of ability or disability. This year, Grade 6 students from Riverside School continued their visits to the Bhaipura Centre, culminating in the creation of a Happy Healing Room—a safe, joyful space designed and funded by the students and their parents. Alongside this, Prabhat also joined Riverside's Coffee at Riverside sessions, engaging students in dialogue about disability and inclusion.

The spirit of inclusion extended further when the students participated in a Diya decoration activity with Prabhat's children at Udgam High School.

As they reflected during one of their visits,

"We saw our students break down their assumptions, forming heartwarming connections with their new friends at Prabhat. It was a truly enriching experience, filled with moments of laughter, learning, and mutual growth."

Looking ahead, Buddy Interaction with Riverside will expand into visits to other schools in the coming year, strengthening advocacy and awareness from an early age.



Vocational Programme

Vocational skills are vital for both Prabhat and its students. Ensuring that individuals not only find suitable work but also sustain it with minimal difficulty is key. This year, through a survey of 112 individuals, we identified skills and opportunities, and trained nearly 60 individuals in screen-printing, sewing, and small-scale production. Engagement with local industries led to 41 placements, with continued follow-up to ensure retention.

Support often goes beyond training — from adding wheels to a trainee’s stool for easier movement, to accompanying another employee daily until he gained confidence to travel and work independently. These small but crucial interventions reflect our commitment to practical, sustainable inclusion in the workplace. Looking ahead, Prabhat will strengthen partnerships with industries, promote home-based livelihood models, and formalize employer sensitization to secure long-term opportunities for people with disabilities.

Summer Camps

Once again, over 500 participants from our centres, Anganwadis, and schools joined in, with volunteers and youth leaders adding fresh energy to our cherished tradition. The camps continued to foster creativity, friendships, and acceptance, making another summer memorable.



Festivals & Celebrations

Festivals and our *Ek Din Prabhat ke Naam* initiative continued to bring joy, laughter, and shared memories for children and well-wishers alike. These moments nurtured inclusion, belonging, and community bonds that stay long after the day has ended.



Community Based Rehabilitation

Prabhat's Community-Based Rehabilitation (CBR) program is built on the belief that inclusion begins where the child belongs: within their home and community. The program reaches children who cannot access Prabhat Centres due to barriers of mobility, distance, or awareness, ensuring that no child is left behind. Through home-based interventions, health camps, and family engagement, the CBR team works to strengthen local ecosystems of care.

The focus is twofold: to empower families with knowledge and skills to support their children's development, and to build community capacities that sustain inclusion long after direct interventions end. Whether through door-to-door awareness drives, parent meetings, or specialized therapy sessions at home, every effort is guided by the conviction that lasting inclusion grows from within the community itself.

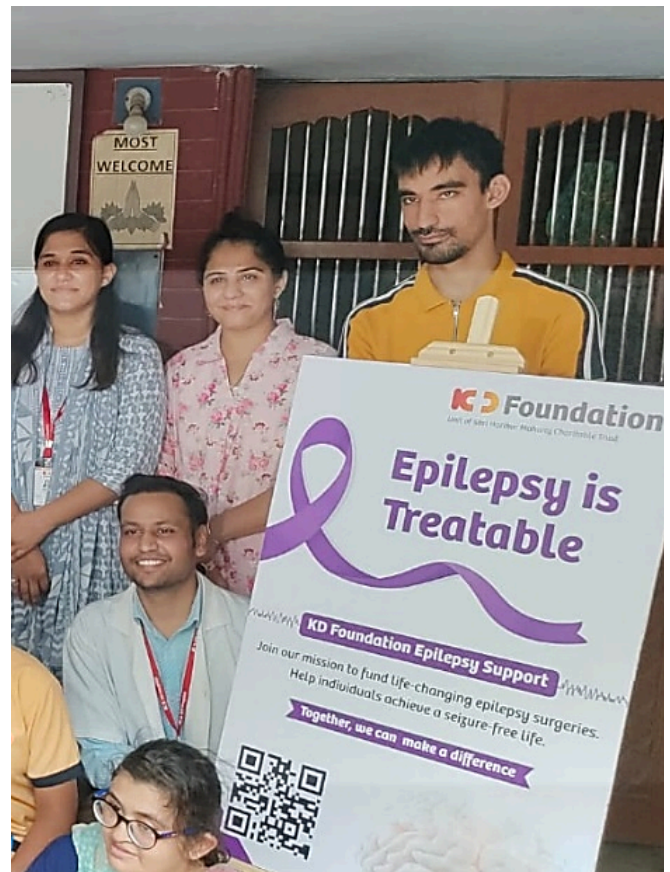


Health Camps

As part of our Community-Based Rehabilitation efforts, Prabhat organized health camps across Bhaipura, Amraiwadi, Hatkeshwar, CTM, Jashodanagar, and Maninagar, reaching over 140 children and families. These camps addressed a wide range of needs, including cerebral palsy, autism, Down Syndrome, ADHD, visual and mobility impairments—providing essential check-ups, screenings, and guidance.



In collaboration with KD Foundation's Pankh program, paediatric and epilepsy-focused camps offered specialized support, from assessments to medication and counselling. Beyond immediate care, these camps help shape individual education plans and strengthen families' confidence.

Working with Parents

Parents are our strongest allies in creating inclusive, nurturing environments for children with special needs. Throughout the year, Prabhat continued to build this partnership through workshops, trainings, and dialogues designed to strengthen their confidence and wellbeing.

A workshop for 20 fathers opened space for honest reflection on their roles and challenges which ranged from financial pressures to limited time with their children. The conversations highlighted the emotional realities of caregiving and reaffirmed the need for continued engagement with fathers in future sessions..



Mothers, too, participated in hands-on sessions focusing on their child's early development, independence, and adaptability. In addition, a session on menstrual health and hygiene for mothers and adolescent girls with disabilities created a safe forum for awareness and shared experience, addressing often-overlooked aspects of their wellbeing.

Looking ahead, we're planning to form Parent Support Groups that provides platforms for families to share experiences, build collective strength, and sustain community awareness. Dedicated Mothers' Circles will also be initiated to promote both mental and physical wellbeing, ensuring parents receive the same support they tirelessly offer their children.

Several aids and appliances through distribution camps in collaboration with partners such as Shree Bhagwan Mahavir Viklang Sahayata Samiti, CRC, Shantivan etc was facilitated by Prabhat this year. Mobility aids including wheelchairs, calipers, crutches, and Jaipur Foot were provided, strengthening independence and enhancing quality of life for many beneficiaries.



Mobility that Matters for Manojbhai

Manojbhai Bharwad, a father of two and a person with locomotor disability, once struggled to move beyond his home due to limited mobility and financial constraints. Through Prabhat's support, he received a wheelchair, a battery-operated tricycle, and a prosthetic limb - each transforming a barrier into a pathway.

Today, Manojbhai drives an auto-rickshaw to support his family, accompanies his son Hardik (who has multiple disabilities) to therapy, and actively participates in para-sports at the Olympic level. His journey reflects not just personal resilience, but the life-changing impact of accessible mobility aids which enables livelihood, dignity, and community connection.

A Story of Support Beyond Mobility

Allarakha Arif (name changed), an 11-year-old with cerebral palsy and intellectual disability, lives in a marginalized dump yard settlement where, access to documentation and government schemes were out of reach. His family lacked the knowledge and resources to secure an Aadhaar card which blocked the essential disability benefits usually provided by the government. Through our support, Allarakha received help with documentation and access to key entitlements: a disability pension, travel pass, wheelchair, and callipers. These supports have eased daily mobility, strengthened financial stability, and boosted his confidence to engage with the world. For Allarakha's mother, who single-handedly manages the household, this assistance has been life-changing. Prabhat's intervention turned bureaucratic barriers into stepping stones for inclusion.

Prabhat also extended personalized therapy, education, and care to children unable to access our centers in the Bhaipura area. By integrating support within the home environment and engaging local community members, the program ensures consistency, sustainability, and holistic development for every child.

Home Based Rehabilitation



Bridging the Gap: Community Based Care for Hussain

At just 18 months, Hussain (name changed) struggled to sit up due to physical and cognitive delays. His family faced steep costs and long travels for therapy until they learned about our CBR program. Through accessible, home-based physiotherapy and consistent support, Hussain now walks with assistance, identifies objects, and engages socially. His mother, Reshmaben Rangrez, calls this progress “a joy rooted in hope and dedication.” Our CBR model has not only accelerated Hussain’s development but also empowered his family to provide nurturing, stress-free support.

Advocacy With Networking

Inclusion is not achieved in isolation- it thrives when awareness, empathy, and collaboration intersect. For Prabhat, advocacy and networking are not standalone programs but threads that weave through every aspect of our work. What began as efforts to reduce stigma and fear around disability has evolved into partnerships, awareness campaigns, and collaborative research that influence how inclusion is understood and practiced. By engaging schools, corporates, design institutions, and government bodies, Prabhat continues to create spaces where children and adults with special needs are seen, heard, and included.



Corporate Advocacy & Visibility

A powerful collaboration with Swati Procon Group brought the message of inclusion to Ahmedabad's streets through hoardings featuring Prabhat's children with the call to action "Be the reason for their celebration." The campaign transformed urban billboards into spaces of empathy and reflection.

Swati Procon also hosted a festive Diwali event for our children, combining corporate engagement with community celebration — a meaningful example of inclusion in practice.

Engaging the Youth through Internships

Youth engagement remained a vital part of Prabhat's networking and advocacy strategy. Internships were organized with LJ University, Ahmedabad University, FLAME University, Nirma University, NID, and IITRAM, offering over a hundred students hands-on experience in inclusive education, design, and law. From creating teaching-learning materials and conducting field studies to developing inclusive prototypes and awareness campaigns, each internship fostered mutual learning and empathy.

Students from Riverside and Udgam Schools led inclusion awareness programs through drama, art, and interaction, while CEPT students designed heritage-themed learning materials for Prabhat's children. These initiatives strengthened the belief that inclusion begins with young minds who are changemakers of tomorrow.



Strengthening Public Systems & Partnerships

Prabhat continued to support and train Anganwadi workers, reaching nearly 1,000 participants at the C-MAM training program in Nikol. The session emphasized early identification, inclusion, and responsive teaching practices. We also participated in the Wipro Foundation's Partner Meet, which focused on



strengthening capacity-building networks and the collective learning ecosystem among like-minded organizations.

Efforts to enhance the use of resource rooms in government schools also gained attention. Educators from Samagra Shiksha Abhiyan and school principals visited Prabhat's Kankaria Resource Room to observe inclusive education models that integrate therapy and classroom learning.

Partnerships with Academic Institutions

Prabhat's long-standing collaborations with educational institutions remained at the heart of its advocacy. At Anant National University, our partnership expanded into new dimensions — from delivering a Community-Based Rehabilitation session under Anant Samvaad to co-developing a white paper on disability sector challenges with experts across India. The collaboration also produced two documentaries: *Up on the Shoulder* and *Chashm-e-Mazhar* which highlighted family roles and resilience in disability care. A special screening at Anant University brought together students, parents, and educators for meaningful dialogue.

Our work with National Institute of Design (NID) continued to push the boundaries of innovation. Students developed and tested assistive prototypes for children with cerebral palsy and created play-based learning tools for activities of daily living. These collaborations demonstrated how design thinking can drive accessibility and inclusion.

Prabhat also signed a major Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with the Composite Regional Centre (CRC), paving the way for joint programs on vocational training, community rehabilitation, assistive aid distribution, and professional development. This partnership led us to be able to distribute necessary aids, appliances and educational kits to the persons with disabilities in need throughout the year.



Research for Advocacy

This year, Prabhat contributed to two major research initiatives addressing systemic challenges faced by persons with disabilities.

In collaboration with PRIA (Participatory Research in Asia) and the Martha Farrell Foundation, we examined the mobility barriers that affect persons with disabilities in commuting and public transport access.

Additionally, our partnership with Loughborough University (UK) and Dr. Amita Bhakta focused on energy access for persons with disabilities in Ahmedabad, exploring intersections between accessibility, infrastructure, and care. With immense dedication, the team pioneered the use of methods like PhotoVoice and expressive drawing to capture authentic voices and illuminate novel insights into how individuals navigate challenges in accessing energy for essential daily tasks, from cooking to operating assistive devices. It highlights the urgent need for inclusive energy solutions that truly serve all members of our community.



Public Engagement & Awareness

Prabhat actively participated in events that bridged civic awareness with inclusion. Through the Adani Marathon (Ahmedabad Chapter), held in collaboration with Aidbees, we engaged with over 20,000 runners, sharing stories and spreading awareness about inclusion.

We were also invited by the Election Commission to assist persons with disabilities at the Vatva polling station during the Lok Sabha elections, ensuring accessibility and dignity for every voter.

Another highlight was the Princess Walk, a collaboration with designer Zeel Agarwal's ZRA Couture, where our girls walked the ramp in celebration of confidence and diversity. The event deeply moved families and audiences alike, leaving a lasting impression of empowerment and pride.



Capacity Building

This year, Prabhat invested deeply in strengthening its internal capacities and team spirit. A two-day orientation workshop welcomed new members, fostering collaboration, trust, and shared understanding of Prabhat's vision and programs.

Through the year, staff participated in various training initiatives supported by our partners Artsparks, Foundation, Ummeed Institute, & Pragat Shikshan Sansthan. We concluded the year with a four-day Annual Retreat to Lonavala, Matheran, and Khandala, blending strategic planning with much-needed rejuvenation.



Challenges

Over the years, Prabhat has learned that progress in inclusion is rarely straightforward. While our journey has brought meaningful change to many lives, certain challenges remain deeply rooted in the realities of the communities we serve. One of the most significant barriers we continue to face is the lack of early intervention and early diagnosis, particularly in rural and economically disadvantaged areas. There exists a persistent cycle of unawareness, misinformation, and stigma. Many parents are unable to identify developmental delays in their children due to limited access to information, low literacy levels, or cultural beliefs. In some families, even when differences are noticed, they are dismissed or misinterpreted, often until it is too late for early action.

By the time families reach Prabhat, the delay in diagnosis has already impacted the child's development and health. Our team, therefore, works with the parents in order to help them process, accept, and understand their child's needs. This dual responsibility of supporting both the child and the family medically, emotionally, and socially can be complex and resource-intensive. Yet, it is also one of the most vital aspects of our work.

Early intervention services, like speech therapy, occupational therapy & sensory therapy, is likely to be more effective & cost less the earlier it is provided.

Moving Forward

Prabhat intends to strengthen its focus on early intervention. We plan to conduct more developmental assessments, ensure timely therapeutic interventions, and design structured awareness sessions for parents and caregivers. Parent Support Groups will play a central role in this process, helping families share experiences, learn from one another, and find collective strength. We aim to create consistent channels of counselling and dialogue so that parents are empowered to take proactive steps in their child's journey.

Inclusion and dignity for every child with disability will continue to remain at the heart of all our efforts. Our goal is to embed inclusivity not just as a practice, but as a value—one that guides every action, every program, and every relationship. Through early identification, informed parenting, and a community built on understanding, we aspire to give every child the opportunity to grow with confidence and thrive with dignity.



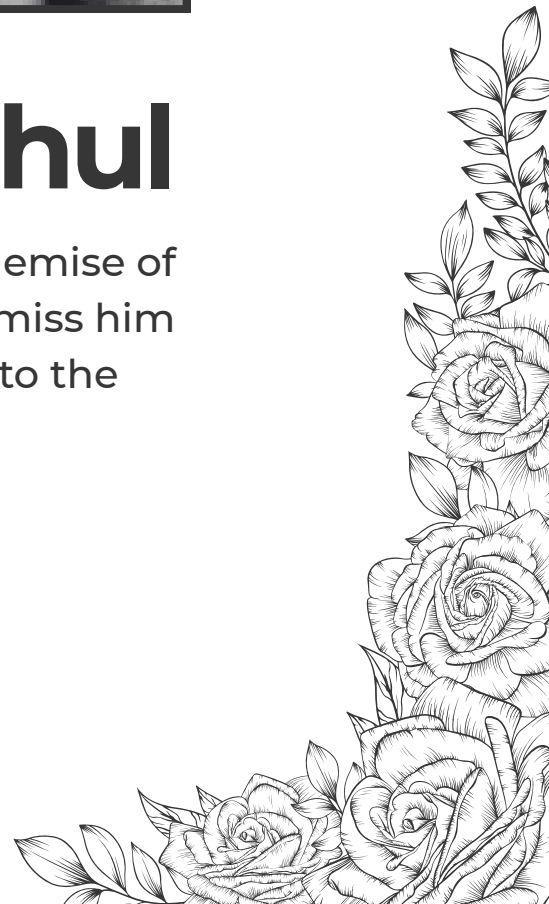

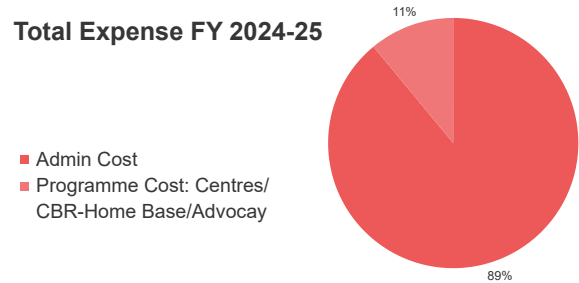

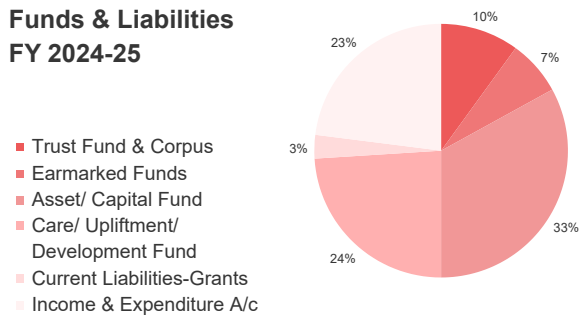
Total Expense FY 2024-25

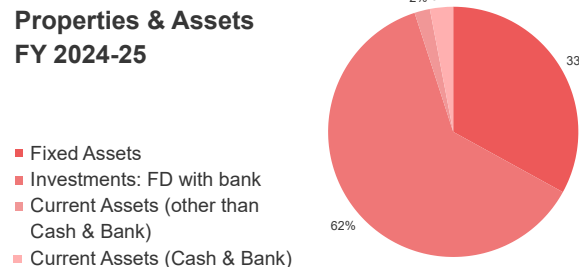
